

What is the ACCUPLACER test?

It is an assessment test approved by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board as an acceptable assessment/placement test for college entrance purposes.

It is equal to THEA and can also be used for retesting. You can take your ACCUPLACER test at any of the four Navarro College campuses.

What is the test like?

The ACCUPLACER test is a computerized assessment test which covers reading, writing, and math. It also includes a 300-600 word persuasive essay on an assigned topic. You have a total of three hours and 10 minutes to complete the test. No special computer skills are required.

How much does the test cost?

The ACCUPLACER tests cost \$29. You pay for the test in the Cashier's Office if testing in Corsicana or at the main office at one of our other

campuses. They accept cash, personal checks, money orders, debit cards, and major credit cards.

How do I arrange to take the ACCUPLACER test?

You need to call and schedule an appointment in advance at one of our four campus Testing Centers. You must turn in an application for admission to the college to be able to receive your scores. You may contact one of the Navarro College campuses at the following numbers.

What do I need to bring with me?

On your test day, you must have a photo ID, the \$29.00 receipt, and social security number. **You will not be admitted with the following items:** cell phones, any electronic devices, personal calculators, highlighters, papers,

books, backpacks, food, or drinks.

When do I get my scores?

All of the scores for the ACCUPLACER test are available the same day. After you've taken the test, a counselor will help you interpret your scores when you register for classes.

What happens if I don't pass the assessment test?

You may call the campus nearest you and schedule an appointment to retake any sections you failed; however, you are required to pay the test fee each time you retest. If you do not pass all areas of the assessment test, you must enroll in developmental classes, but you will be able to take college-level courses as well. Some college-level courses are "stratified," which means that students must pass some areas of an assessment test in order to enroll in those courses. Currently, English, Government, History, Psychology, College Math, and College Algebra
